"At a committee meeting of the Association held on Thursday evening last, it was decided that the Association football must not exceed an average circumference of 28 inches, nor less than 27 inches, and that the balls used in the matches for the Association Challenge Cup be of this regulation size. It was also resolved that an English Eleven should be sent to Glasgow, during the current season to play an Eleven of Scotland; and that all the arrangements for the match should be in the hands of the Committee of the Football Association. In confirming the rules for the Association Cup, a motion was carried that the winners of 1872-73 should, in the competition for 1873-74, be drawn in the first ties, and play throughout, as in the case of other clubs." F:"The first match of the season at the Oval is usually between the above clubs, and Saturday last was no exception to the general rule. In another feature, however, the game showed a marked difference to those of previous years, as on this occasion the Clapham Rovers had to suffer a decisive defeat, only the second that they have undergone ever since the first meeting of the two clubs. At half past three o'clock the Clapham captain kicked off, the Wanderers having derived little advantage from the choice of goals, as the wind was blowing across the ground. For a few minutes the vigorous play of their forwards enabled the Rovers to maintain a slight advantage, but the Wanderers soon recovered their position and about a quarter of an hour had elapsed when an ill-advised kick by one of the Clapham backs gave them a goal, the ball having first been kicked by C.W. Alcock. After this first success the Wanderers had to work hard to hold their own, as more than once their posts were seriously threatened by the skilful dribbling and speedy rushes of Holden and A. Nash. Neither had the Wanderers been idle meanwhile, T.C. Hooman especially distinguishing himself by his excellent

play and judicious "middling". For some time, however, none of his efforts had been attended with fortunate results, but just before the end of the game, by clever kicks from the side he gave three chances to Wollaston, and the latter was not slow in thrice accomplishing the fall of the Clapham goal, the Wanderers at the close remaining the victors by four goals to none. On behalf of the winners, T.C. Hooman and C.H. Wollaston (forward), and R.Barker and R.C. Welch (back), were most

useful throughout; for the Rovers, A. Nash, G. Holden, J. Kenrick, and R. Ogilvie in their several positions."

SM:"...a long kick with the left foot by C.W.Alcock from a half volley resulted in a goal for the Wanderers, one of the Clapham backs, instead of leaving it for the goalkeeper, injudiciously helping it by a badly-executed kick into the space between the posts." "Towards the end the aspect of events changed materially and by the aid of some exceedingly well-concerted play between T.C.Hooman and C.H.Wollaston the latter was able to add three more goals to the score of the Wanderers before time was called, the home team thus realising a signal victory."

F:"On Saturday last, the Surrey Club, so long identified with cricket, made its +debut in the football world with a match against the Wanderers. The latter were not so well represented as they might have been, but they were sufficiently strong enough for their opponents, although the Club at the last moment lost the valuable help of C.J. Chenery, and during the course of the game were further deprived of the services of their goalkeeper. At the outset the play was rather in favour of the Club, and on more than one occasion the "keeping" of J. Kirkpatrick alone prevented the Wanderers from witnessing the surrender of their goal. As the game progressed, however, the aspect of affairs became more even, and until the call of half time each side had in turn been placed upon the defensive, but without the result of any score. After the change of ends the Wanderers, who now had the advantage in point of numbers, commenced to press their adversaries rather closely, and before long a goal was placed to their account through a neat piece of play by W.P. Crake. From this point until the end the

forwards of the Surrey Club worked hard to retrieve their loss, but, in spite of several good runs by T.C.Hooman and the general excellence of the backing up, they had been unable to do more than seriously endanger the safety of the enemy's lines, the call of time thus leaving the victory in the possession of the Wanderers by one goal to none. For the Club T.C.Hooman's dribbling was noticeable throughout, and R.C.Welch was a most efficient back, while for the Wanderers W.P.Crake, and A.H.Thornton did most of the work, with the help of occasional runs by W.S.Rawson and R.Barker, and aided greatly by the effective back play of J.H.Giffard and J.Kirkpatrick."

SM:"The Surrey eleven was, with the exception of H.D.S. Vidal, composed of members of the Surrey Cricket Club, though most of their names have been identified previously in connection with the Wanderers." "At half time ends were changed, the club having previously lost the services of P.Merton, one of its most useful as well as ornamental members. Towards the end the Wanderers, despite the occasional rushes of some few of the Surrey players, had the best of the game, the retirement of their goalkeeper, as above mentioned, proving a serious disadvantage. Still the Wanderers were prevented from obtaining any score until a quarter of an hour before the call of time, when W.P. Crake cleverly secured a goal, the only success that fell to either party during the game."

It was, however, soon returned to neutral ground, and the game was carried on with great spirit and equality. The Foresters, however, by dint of good backing up and energetic play, several times endangered the Rovers' goal, and the ball was twice kicked over the tape. When half-time was called, however, no definite advantage had been secured by either side. The Foresters, with the wind in their favour, now worked capitally together, and the ball was kept in dangerous proximity to the Rovers' goal, through which it was at length driven by Shuttleworth. It was again started, and soon after, Cazenove, by a capital bit of play, secured another goal for the home team. Ends were then changed, and also the luck for some time; the next goal that fell being to the credit of Norwood, kicked by A.L. Elborough. Soon after that one of the visitors obtained another goal for his side, which was allowed although the man was called "off side". and was consequently unmolested at the proper time by the backs. For Norwood White and R. Smith were the most conspicuos forwards, and the halfbacks, Leeds and A.L. Elborough deserve praise. A. Lloyd for the Palace, as also Neame and Bouch were equally worthy of notice."

SM:"This match was played at Woodside on Saturday last, the 12<sup>th</sup> inst., and resulted in favour of the former by two goals to one. Carthusian: "This was the first foreign match of the season, and as such, looked forward to by everyone with great eagerness.." "At four oclock-the foreigners not having been able to arrive earlier, owing to the inconvenient arrangement of trains-T.P.Gandell kicked off for Charterhouse. The home team at once settled down to their work, and forced the ball towards the Civil Service lines. About ten minutes past four E.H.Parry, after a plucky rush, carefully middled the ball to F.H.Firth, who found no difficulty in scoring our first goal. With one goal to the bad the Civil Service did all they could to turn the tide of victory, and, for a short time, would almost have penned their opponents, but for the fine play of Williams and Staveley. Gradually the better training and organisation of the School began to tell, and the Civil Service, in their turn, were completely driven back. Two good shots, by Davies and Parry, were well stopped by the goalkeeper, who found no lack of employment throughout the game. At length, after repeated shots, a third goal was scored for the home team, by F.H.Firth, to whom, after some clever dribbling, T.P.Gandell middled the ball(SM:"Parry having previously middled it"). Towards the end of the game the Civil Service seemed determined to retrieve their fallen fortunes. Success, however, did not attend their energetic efforts; but shortly before time was called, Gipps, (SM:"took the ball through their midst") by the best piece of play in the whole match, kicked the fourth and last goal for Charterhouse."

F:"On Saturday last these two clubs met at Kennington Oval to play their first match of the present season. The result was a close and interesting match until the end, when the Wanderers asserted their superiority in an unmistakeable manner. Shortly before three o'clock the ball was kicked off by the Uptonian captain, and for some little time the Wanderers played up with so little energy that the ball was kept chiefly in their portion of the ground. Steadily, however, the Wanderers warmed to their work, and after this, until half time was called, they maintained an attitude strictly offensive, W.P.Crake and R.W.Powell distinguishing themselves by repeated attacks on the Upton lines.After the change of ends the Uptonians again were pressed rather severely,until at length R.Ogilvie,who was playing half back,got well away,and after a good run,followed by a very clever kick,succeeded in gaining a well-earned goal for Upton. After this the Wanderers worked hard, and incited to fresh efforts by the possibility of defeat, they kept their opponents closely confined to their own quarters. At half past four o'clock no goal had rewarded their exertions, but after this, during the half hour that still remained, they had the game entirely in their own hands, and goal followed goal, until at last four had been obtained. F:"The first of the three matches which now take place annually between these head centres of the "dribbling game" was played on the Bramall-lane Cricket Ground, Sheffield, on Saturday last. It was generally anticipated that a very even contest would be the issue of this last meeting, although the laws enforced were those of the Sheffield Association, which are utterly strange to the Londoners, from their almost entire absence of anything like an off-side rule. In this expectation, however, the friends of the Southerners were greatly disappointed, as, with the exception of the first and last quarter of an hour, they were overpowered by their opponents, and utterly unable to accustom themselves to the passing on, which marks the game played by Sheffield. Soon after three o'clock the ball was kicked off by the London captain, the interest evinced in the struggle being proved by the number of spectators, who at the very commencement could not have numbered less than 5000. At the very outset the Wanderers had to face a slight breeze, but they set to work with good vigour and their dribbling soon proved effective, as after a lapse of barely five minutes a good run down, in which A.G. Bonsor and J. Chenery were conspicuous, enabled G.G. Kennedy to secure a well-merited goal for London.

(SM:"Up to this time C.W.Alcock and A.F.Kinnaird had been playing as half backs for the South,with R.C.Welch as back and A.Morten as goalkeeper,but here a change was made by the substitution of C.J.Chenery for A.Kinnaird ,while the two previous half backs were removed forward to aid the attacking forces. From this time, however, the Londoners fared badly, as the new members of their eleven seemed unable to enter into the spirit of the Sheffield Rules, and preferred to dribble and

back up after their usual style, instead of imitating the tactics of their opponents, while their back play was very weak, the goal-keeper alone excepted.").

This early success by no means dispirited the Sheffielders, but, on the contrary, infused such fresh vigour into their play that during the rest of the game they enjoyed a decided advantage. Soon after the change of ends the Northerners commenced a series of offensive tactics, and with the skilful development of their forces, as usual, to help, it was not long before a neat piece of passing by C. Mills gave J.C. Clegg a chance of obtaining a goal for Sheffield, and thus equalising the game for a time. Again assisted by the wind the Sheffield eleven set their adversaries a worthy example of energy, but the Londoners, although playing their own game well, were placed at a great disadvantage in their evident inability or disinclination to accustom themselves to the peculiarity of the Sheffield rules. Hence they fared badly for some time, and before a quarter past three o'clock three more goals had fallen to Sheffield, the first after a truly brilliant run down by J.C. Clegg+(SM:"..almost the whole length of the ground")

(SM:"...Willey again transferred the ball to Wood, and a good kick by the latter was the means of registering the third goal to the discredit of the Londoners. The fourth and last goal soon followed, as a misunderstanding on the part of one of the London backs, who was in doubt as to the privelege of his position at the Sheffield game, and thus allowed the ball to pass between the posts, when he could have easily prevented it, allowed Willey to secure a very lucky success."), +the last owing to the uncertainty of one of the London backs as to his exact priveleges.")During the last quarter of an hour the play was most spirited, and indeed this portion of the contest was productive of the most even strife during the course of the match. It was only towards the end that the Londoners appeared to grasp the proper method of playing the Sheffield game, and during the last fifteen minutes they kept the ball well down in the northern lines, so much so that C.W.Alcock twice by good rushes drove the ball into the centre of the posts, on the second occasion so well that the goal-keeper only just managed to reach it in time. Still at half-past four o'clock the London eleven had not been able to add to their party score, and thus Sheffield claimed the victory by four goals to one. The play of the northern eleven was uniformly of the very best description ,J.C.Clegg distinguishing himself greatly ,as did Carr in defence of goal. On the other side A. Morten was most gallant and untiring in his charge of the post, and A.F.Kinnaird on more than one occasion showed prominently forward. The second match will be played at Kennington Oval on Saturdy Jan 4.1873, according to Association rules."

SM:"After the connclusion of the match, as usual, the elevens dined together at the Adelphi Hotel, Mr R.W.Dickenson occupying the chair , with the London captain his vis-à-vis. Those of the Londoners who left the same evening were as customary treated to and ovation on their departure from the Midland Station..."

F:"On Saturday last the Barnes Club sent a team as usual to play the annual match against the Engineers on the Lines at Chatham. The result, in spite of the greasy condition of the ground, which greatly retarded any brilliant display of dribbling, was a pleasant game, though the result was a somewhat easy victory for the Engineers by two goals to none. The Barnes captain won the toss, though he derived little advantage from the choice of position, as the wind was blowing across the ground. At the start the ball without delay was carried down into the Barnes' quarters, and there it remained in close proximity to the goal-posts during the greater part of the game. It was soon evident that the Barnes form was not that "of yore" especially in the weakness of their back play; but still they succeeded in preventing the downfall of their goal until just before half-time when a very good run-down, and judiciuosly turned kick (SM:"by Lieut. G.Barker") enabled one of the centre players of the R.E. to land the ball safely between the posts. Ends were then changed, and soon a similar piece of play by Lieut. Von Donop placed a second goal to the credit of the Engineers. Several times the Barnes forwards, noteably Weston and Clarkson, worked hard to get the ball past the Sapper backs, but without success; while the plucky and brilliant dribbling efforts of B. Collins were only frustrated by the determined resistance of the gallant major. The forwards of the Engineers, with one exception, played well together, considering that they are a new eleven. Lieuts. Blackburn and Von Donop deserve special mention for their fast dribbling and untiring energy, while the back play of Lieuts. Goodwyn and Wood was perfect." F:"The above match was played at the Oval on Saturday last, and was productive, despite the unfavourable condition of the ground from previous heavy rains, of a lively and interesting game. The Gitanos won the toss, and, with the wind to help them, in a very short time, secured a goal (SM:"some quarter of an hour after play had begun"). The consequent change of ends, however, brought an improvement in the fortunes of the Service, and before long thay succeeded in getting the ball in front of their adversaries' goal, finally, by a judicious kick from the foot of A.E. Bateman, landing it between the posts. This reverse caused the Gitanos to redouble their efforts, and so well did they succeed in their attack, that before time they had added two more goals to their score, thus winning eventually by three goals to one. For the victors, H.S. Ferguson and R.W. Powell (forward) and H.F. H. Wilson (back) played well; while for the Service, T.W. Blomefield and W.F. Eaton, both as half backs and forward, were extremely useful, and F.R. Round and C.W. A. Trollope also worked hard to retrieve the fortunes of their side." This was the first meeting of the present season, and the result was the defeat of the School, who were not only unable to achieve any score, but were powerless to prevent their opponents from realising two goals. The Wanderers, who, it must be remarked were a rather powerful eleven, at the outset had the aid of a very stiff breeze, and with this assistance they succeeded in obtaining a goal, through the agency of C.H.Wollaston, though this disaster might have been averted had not the chances of Wanderers been greatly hampered by a miss-kick on the part of one of the School backs. The change of ends naturally transferred all the benefit of wind to the Westminsters, and full use they made thereof, on several occasions having scrimmages in the very centre of the Wanderers' posts; still all were unproductive, and at last a well-contested run by C.H.Wollaston, C.J.Chenery, and C.W.Alcock, in turn enabled the last named to secure the second goal gained for the visitors. During the few minutes that then remained, the Wanderers made desperate efforts to secure further triumphs, but to no purpose, and the call of time put an end to one of the most enjoyable and gamely-fought matches in which these two clubs have ever been engaged. The Westminsters played well together, and their backing-up was excellent. Their goalkeeper, too, was most effective, while W.S.Rawson, by his unerring kicking at half back, and H.D.S. Vidal, by his brilliant runs, fully sustained their old reputations. On the side of the Wanderers, the two backs, A.C. Thompson and C.W.Stephenson, lent the most valuable aid throughout."

SM:"At about a quarter past three o'clock the ball was thrown up as usual in the centre of the ground by the School captain, the Wanderers in winning the toss securing the assistance of a very stiff breeze blowing straight down the ground. With this help they naturally had at the outset a decided advantage, and before long a mis-kick by the School back enabled C.H. Wollaston to obtain a goal on their behalf. Ends were then changed, and the School in their turn had the aid of the wind, though the Wanderers were such a strong team that it was thought they would overrun their opponents. At about a quarter to one o'clock the first bully was commenced, and from this time until the end there was a marked equality in the state of affairs, neither side appearing to possess any marked advantage. Unfortunately there was a strong breeze blowing straight across the ground, but still, although this naturally had the effect of increasing the number of bullies, to the detriment of the forward play, there was no lack of good dribbling, and the bullies were generally stiffly contested. Once or twice the Etonians got the ball on to the verge of the opposite goal line during the first half of the game, but each time it was safely removed by those in charge of the defence, and when change arrived there had been nothing in the fight to favour either party, nor did the alteration of positions have any material effect on the aspect of affairs, as now the play showed, if possible, an even greater equality than before, the Wanderers, by the good runs of R.H.Powell and Hon.T.Pelham, more than once threatening lines guarded by the Eton backs. Still, despite the ceaseless efforts of all concerned, the end of the last bully arrived without the achievement of any tangible score by either side, and thus the game ended in a draw without anything definite to either of the contestants. For the School, the kicking of J.C. Welldon, half back, was excellent throughout, and for the Wanderers, A.C. Thompson, in the same position, was as well worhty of praise. We hope this will be the precursor of many equally pleasant matches between the same clubs."

SM:"The first of the two matches which have been arranged to take place during the ensuing season under the above title was played on Saturday last, at the Oval, under circumstances by no means of an inspiring character. Indeed, there was everything from the first to prove fatal to those who had originated the meeting with the hope of producing a large gathering of spectators, for the persistent rains during the last fortnight had so soaked the ground as to prevent the appearance of many who have an aversion to a lengthy position on damp grass, while the threatening aspect of the weather during the morning and afternoon of the match itself was amply sufficient to deter those who would have attended under a state of affairs ordinarily propitious from putting in an appearance. Consequently the preparations made by the secretary of the Surrey Cricket Club were to some extent useless, as the spectators could not have mustered more than five hundred, and the revenues of the Surrey Club thus deriving hardly as much benefit as might have been expected. Owing to the late arrival of some of the representatives of each side play was delayed until twenty minutes past three o'clock, and even at that time the Harrovians only mustered nine, though they were after the lapse of a little time reinforced to reach their complement of eleven. At the very outset it seemed that the Etonians were singularly favoured, as they had been able to collect the very best eleven that was at their disposal, while on the other hand the Harrovians were most unlucky in losing first the valuable services of their captain-M.P.Betts-and afterwards of four of their number, who evidently preferred the fulfilment of minor engagements to the chance of aiding their old School. The Eton captain won the toss, and the ball was started from the goal adjoining the gas-works by C.W.Alcock on behalf of the Harrovians. At the very first the Etonians gave a proof of their superiority, as the ball was by a well-concerted rush of their forwards carried down to the Harrow goal, which was thus early placed in imminent peril. This danger was safely averted, but only to be repeated without loss of time, and before a quarter of an hour had elepsed a good run by J.R. Sturgis accredited the Etonians with a goal amid the greatest excitement. Ends were consequently changed, and despite the unequal nature of the struggle they had to meet the Harrovians went to work gallantly to retrieve, if possible, their loss, W.P. Crake especially setting a worthy example to his side by the energy of his play and the brilliancy of his dribbling. On the other hand the Harrovians were so severely handicapped that their chances seemed hopeless, several of their side appearing strangers to the rules, as well as imbued with an evident desire not to interfere with the success of the frequent runs made by the Eton forwards. Still, in spite of frequent attacks by the Etonians, the Harrow goal was bravely protected, thanks to the unceasing energy of R.C.Welch,until only about ten minutes remained,and here,when darkness had for some time interfered with the play, a fine run by F.J.Patton resulted in a second goal for Eton, though the success could only be decerned by the fortunate few placed in the neighbourhood of the Harrow posts. Again, despite the almost complete darkness, play was resumed ,and during the few minutes left the Harrovians were able to secure their only goal,this achievement being due to the excellent backing-up, as well as marvellous clearness of vision, of G.G.Kennedy. Thus the Etonians won by two goals to one...."

Owing to the somewhat tardy appearance of the Rovers, who played one short, the game was not commenced till late, and darkness put an end to hostilities after only one hour's play. The ground was decidedly heavy, and the wind slightly in favour of the higher goal, which was secured by the home captain for the first half hour, during which time the game was evenly contested, the Engineers, however, having generally the best of it. At the change of half time no goal had been obtained, notwithstanding some very close scrimmages (resembling another game) took place in proximity to the Rovers' goal, which was most energetically and dexterously kept by R. Ogilvie. The Sappers' goal was at one time seriously imperilled by a fine long kick by E.T. Law, who proved an efficient back throughout the game. On ends being changed the aspect of the game changed also, for up to call of time the Engineers kept up a continued volley on the home goal-posts, and sorely taxed the defensive powers of its goal-keeper."

FA 1873 P.48:"The first match of any importance that has taken place over the border according to the rules of the Football Association,was played at Glasgow on Saturday, November 30,1872. Though both elevens did all they knew, no decision was arrived at, neither side being able to force their opponents' lines."

SM:"This match, from the fact that it is the first of any great importance that has taken place over the Border according to the rules of the Football Association, has created an immense amount of interest both in Scotland and England, was played on Saturday last, on the West of Scotland Cricket Ground at Partick, near Glasgow, and was attended deservedly with the greatest success that has probably ever been accorded to a contest under these laws. The present meeting had been contemplated for the last two years, but from sundry reasons the intentions of those who had the promotion were frustrated or delayed by certain difficulties at the time insuperable. The visit of the Queen's Park Football Club of Glasgow to London in the spring of the present year to play one of the ties for the Association Challenge Cup against the Wanderers gave an additional impetus to the work on the English side, and unquestionably the pluck evinced by the members of that club in being the first to travel so long a distance to try conclusions with one of the very strongest clubs in England at Association Rules, had the greatest effect in producing the first visit of an Association Eleven to Scottish soil. It was arranged at this same meeting between the Wanderers and the Queen's Park Club, Glasgow, in February last, that during the season of 1872-73 a request should be made to the committee of the Football Association to collect an eleven to represent England for the purpose of visiting Scotland to do battle against a similar number of Scotchmen under the laws provided by the committee of the Football Association. It was then considered that there might be obstacles in the way of an early fixture for the contest, but events soon proved that the promoters would have a very easy task in bringing matters to a successful issue from the ready manner in which the preliminaries were settled, so warmly was the first proposition that emanated from the committee of the Association received by the various clubs that support their body, and, indeed, by all who were interested in the decision of the match. At first it was decided that the committee would undertake the collection of the English eleven, and that the arrangement of matters on the Scotch side should be left in the hands of the members of the committee of the Queen's Park Club, of Glasgow, a body that has done so much by its hearty support to the "dribbling" game to earn the thanks of all who have adopted that style of play. It was then suggested from the English management that Monday, November 25, should be fixed as the most suitable day, but on the other hand a representation was made from Scotland that Saturday would be a much more judicious selection, as Glasgow had been settled as the scene of the contest, Monday being a day that would hardly permit those engaged in business the chance of witnessing the first exposition of Association rules in Scotland by an English eleven. This counter proposition, it is needless to say, was at once accepted on behalf of the Englishmen, though at the same time it may be stated that the change of days, by necesitating a long journey by rail on the part of some of their members on the very night previous to the contest itself,

was a concession that did not work to their advantage. Consequently, by mutual consent, Saturday, November 30 was settled, and at once both sides set to work to secure the best forces at their disposal. The first appeal of the committee of the Association to the English players was met at once, and there was a large number of candidates, the aspirants comprising a great majority of the most brilliant exponents of the game. To select out of these the best representative eleven a special meeting of the committee of the Football Association was held, and after some discussion the choice of that body fell on the following players, two being added in the case of accident. They were C.W.Alcock(Wanderers), J.C.Clegg(Sheffield Club), M.P.Betts(Harrow Chequers), T.C.Hooman (Wanderers), E.H. Greenhalgh (Nottingham Club), C.J. Ottaway (Oxford University), C.J. Chenery (Crystal Palace Club), A. Morten (Crystal Palace Club), R.C. Welch (Harrow Chequers), F. Chappell (Oxford University), and C.J.Morice(Barnes Club); reserves, G.Holden (Clapham Rovers) and W.J.Maynard (1<sup>ST</sup> Surrey Rifles). The selection was undoubtedly most judicious, and up to within a fortnight of the day of the match it seemed certain that the assistance of the reserves would not be needed. Here, however, the first sign of a change occurred, as it was then found that M.P. Betts had not recovered sufficiently from an old wound to be able to think about playing. A sprained knee also disabled C.W.Alcock, and T.C.Hooman and A.Morten were reluctantly absent, the former in the West of England, the latter detained by attendance at Westminster. Under these circumstances recourse was had to other players:and, fortunately, four good substitutes were speedily found in W.J.Maynard as above, R. Barker (Hertfordshire Rangers), A. Kirke-Smith (Oxford University), and J. Brockbank (Cambridge University). Meanwhile the Scotch had also enlisted a formidable eleven, though they were unable to secure the services of A.F.Kinnaird(of the Wanderers) and Lieut. H.W.Renny-Tailyour(of the Royal Engineers), both Scotchmen of great fame in the south. Unfortunately there was a difficulty on both sides in the way of practice, as the Englishmen were in many cases so separated that all chances of a meeting were impossible, and the weather in Scotland proved fatal to the success of the attempts at practice made by the Scotchmen. The Englishmen mostly arrived in Glasgow on Friday night, and took up their quarters at Carrick's Royal Hotel, George-square, though C.J. Chenery, C.J. Morice, R.C. Welch, and J.Brockbank were unable to leave London until Friday evening, and thus had the enjoyment of travelling all night, C.W. Alcock accompanying the latter contingent to act in the capacity of umpire on the English side. Two o'clock in the afternoon had been fixed as the time for commencing play, and both elevens were ready punctually to the hour, though a start was not made until about twenty minues after two. Even then there was a very large muster of spectators, though the throng increased vastly as the game progressed, every available portion of the ground, as well as every point favourable for a view outside, being filled before the end. The English eleven wore white jerseys, with the arms of England embroidered on the left breast, while their opponents were easily distinguishable by their blue jerseys, these having, too, the the lion of Scotland as the distinguishing emblem. The toss was decided in favour of the Scottish captain, and he elected to occupy the upper goal, he acting as goal-keeper himself, with R.Ker and J.J.Thomson as backs, and Taylor and James Smith as half backs. On behalf of England, on the other hand, R.C. Welch was half-back, E.H. Greenhalgh back, and R.Barker goal-keeper, the last-named being relieved by W.J.Maynard during the second half of the game. Fortunately the weather was fine, as the faint attempt at a drizzle that appeared just before the outset with a praiseworthy regard for the rights of an international struggle, was only of momemtary duration, and the ground, considering all the recent rains, was in fair order, though the surface was so greasy as to militate considerably against the dribbling tactics pursued by the Englishmen.

The kick off by the English gave the signal for warm work, and at once the Scottish eleven, though they were greatly inferior in weight to their antagonists, by the rapidity of their rushes, as well as by the excellence of their backing up, drove the ball into their adversaries' quarters. On the other hand, the English, undeterred by the desperate onslaught, slowly regained their ground, C.J. Ottaway distinguishing himself by his neat dribbling, and A.Kirke-Smith by the energy of his following up. Thus the game progressed, and as the Englishmen got more accustomed to the style of their opponents the contest assumed a most even aspect, Ker-was kicking in the most brilliant style throughout-as effectually frustrating the runs of the English as did R.C.Welch the rushes of the Scotch forwards. Once during the early part of the game-by the good play of C.J.Morice, C.J.Ottaway, and J.Brockbank in conjunction-the ball reached the vicinity of the Scotch goal, and A.Kirke-Smith made a good, but unsuccessful kick,to secure its reduction. With this exception, however, there was literally nothing to choose between the two sides, and in or about the centre of the ground the play remained until just as the first part of the game elapsed. Here a very speedy rush was made by the Scotch forwards, and, by an excellent side kick from one of their number, the ball went apparently on to the tape of the English goal.+The excitement at this supposed success was intense, and from all sides of the ground the cheers rang out lustily, but they were somewhat premature, for it was proved that the ball had passed over the tape and there was no score to be derived therefrom. Thereupon ends were changed, and the game resumed with, if possible, a fresh infusion of vigour on both sides. The game, however, now began to lose its former aspect of equality, for the Englishmen, now becoming more accustomed to their opponents' play, acted as besiegers, and within a short time the ball was well taken down to the Scotch goal, which was only saved by the judicious kicking of R.Smith. Again another general rush, and once more the Scottish fortress was assailed so closely that, first by A.Kirke-Smith and then by C.J.Chenery, it was kicked absolutely against one of the posts. By determination and pluck it was removed by one of the Scotch, and though once or twice it was again placed in imminent danger, it remained intact until the end. During the latter part of the game the Englishmen certainly had the advantage, as their goal-keeper was never once required to use his hands, though to the credit of the Scotch it may be registered that they were able to repel so gallantly the efforts of some of the best and most trained exponents of the dribbling art in England. Consequently, the call of "time" arrived without the achievement of a goal by either side, and thus ended one of the jolliest, one of the most spirited, and most pleasant matches that have ever been played according to Association Rules. The enthusiam at the finish was displayed in a marked manner by the spectators, and each member of the two sides was greeted with a volley of applause as he entered the pavilion. Of the play itself, it can only be said that it was of the most spirited character throughout, and we have rarely seen a match in which every player worked so hard,or there was so much difficulty in ascribing superiority to any in point of individual excellence of play. The backs all did their duty well, while Weir was more than once prominent on the part of the Scotch forwards, and the English captain dribbled well throughout.\*Sides:

"After the match, at the invitation of the Scottish eleven, both sides dined together at Carrick's Hotel, in company with a number of football players of Scotch notoriety. A thoroughly enjoyable evening was spent, the toast of "The Winter Game" (associated with which was the Football Association) being enthusiastically received, as were also those of "The Two Elevens", "The Sheffield Association", and others associated with the cause of the meeting. Throughout the English were treated with a warmth of hospitality which they hope to be able fully to return on the occasion of the return match, which will take place at the Oval, in London, some time in February next."

+F:"Nothing further of moment occurred until within a minute of half-time, when a very fine rush of the Scotch forwards carried the ball past the English backs, and a brilliant kick (BL:"Leckie, who got the ball well in line, made an effort to kick goal, and had the ball only gone an inch under instead of landing on the tape, Scotland would have been the victor") finally secured what to many at a distance seemed a goal. The goal keeper, however was able to reach the ball just in time to steady it over the tape...."Here ends were changed, and from this time the English enjoyed the advantage which had been previously ranged on the side of their opponents. It was evident that by this time they had begun to understand each other's tactics, and their dribbling, good as it was under disadvantageous circumstances of ground, frequently elicited vociferous applause. Once, indeed, they got right in front of the Scotch goal, and twice in succession they kicked it against one of the posts, Chenery and Kirke-Smith each causing it to cannon from the post into play within a few minutes. Still now and again the Scotch rallied and carried the ball bravely into the English quarters, but it was always returned, and, but for the brilliant play of W.Ker, the Scotch back, throughout, success would surely have attended the efforts of England."

SM:"Notwithstanding a perfect deluge of rain which fell at the Oval on Saturday afternoon, November 30, the above clubs were enabled to pull off the first of their annual matches, although the ground was anything but favourable for the players, and time limited to one hour. It will be remembered that on the last occasion, when these two formidable clubs met at the Oval, the Wanderers succeeded in beating the R.E.'s and became possessors of the Association Cup. Matters on Saturday last, however, were reversed, for the Engineers managed to score two goals to their adversaries' nothing, which they chiefly attributed to the R.E.'s mustering a strong team, who worked well together, and backed each other up in a most praiseworthy manner. The Wanderers by no means brought an insignificant ten to the posts, yet it should be remembered that there were several well-known and staunch players missing, and who were doing battle for their nationality in a far

distant country.Mr M.P.Betts kindly undertook the responsibility of umpire, but his services were not required, as the game was played in thorough good form throughout. About three o'clock the ball was started, the home captain winning the toss, and elected to play with the sun (which actually did shine) at his back. For the first quarter of an hour the leather was kicked all over the ground: the Sappers, however, drew towards the Wanderers' territory, where they remained hovering for the greater part of the game, and in close proximity to the Wanderers' half backs, who experienced some difficulty in getting the ball away from the vigorous onslaughts of Lieuts Renny-Tailyour and Ruck. Both goals were scored by some excellent play on the part of the wing players of the R.E., who appeared at all times willing to pass on the ball. On several occasions A.F. Kinnaird rallied his forces, and himself gallantly led, with A.Bonsor and G.G. Kennedy in his wake, some brilliant rushes, only, however, to be frustrated by the R.E. half-backs, who played and kicked well.

C.H. Woolaston worked hard also to turn his enemy's left flank, but was out-manoevered by the tactics of Lieutenants Blackburn and Goodwyn. The half back play of A.C. Thompson was, as usual, much admired, although he did not come off so successfully. All the Sappers deserve credit for their play, and we were glad to see in their old places Lieutenants Renny-Tailyour and Addison."

When ends were changed the play still continued very equal, but fortune favoured the Uxbridge team, for H. The ground was comfortably soft, there was an absence of all unpleasant glare from the sun, everyone expected a wet afternoon, and no one was disappointed. Norwood mustering nine men to their opponents' ten, were allowed to win the toss, their enemies thus early evincing a spirit of placability which was maintained and reciprocated throughout. Upon commencing play it was evident that the home team had the best of it, and for the first half hour their goalkeeper had a sinecure. In fact had the soil been more congenial nothing could have prevented Heath from taking root. During this period three goals were obtained for the Palace, kicked respectively by Fleet, Thompson, and Stainburn. The latter is a rising player, and would infallably have achieved a second goal had he not been disturbed while making his preparations. The Norwoodian commander, seeing matters so desperate, called upon his men to "behave as such", which they did, and H.W. Wilson personally responded by kicking a most scientific goal at long range, the flight of the ball being watched by both sides with breathless interest. The shades of eve were falling fast, the would-be dribblers were falling faster still, and the rain was falling fastest of all, as the Palace strove still further to crush Norwood, and Norwood fought more desperately to assert its equality. Nor in vain, for H.W. Wilson again getting within sixty or seventy yards of the Palace citadel, made another wonderful shot, and although it was asserted by many of the Palatials that the

ball passed over the tape, it was felt that to question the goal was to impugn the accuracy of the kicker, and the point was at once conceded to Norwood. This turn in their affairs had the effect of inducing the Sydenham captain to enquire about time, and a spectator in a mackintosh, who was cowering under a tree a quarter of a mile off(probably the only living thing out of doors in the parish), having found his watch and made an inaudible remark, time was called. Thus ended a most enjoyable match, which goes to prove that, wet or dry, the Palace is the place to spend a happy day. The victory of the Crystal Palace was felt to be no disgrace to their opponents, for the extra goal was fully accounted for by the extra man. Jordan was the best looking-in front-but "t'other side o' Jordan" after his fall, beggared description."

SM:"The latter county had succeeded in mustering possibly the very best eleven that it could have collected ,while Surrey on the other hand,was singularly unfortunate ,as it had not one player capable of undertaking the responsible position of back,owing to the inability of Messrs L.S.Howell and G.H.Reade to play, and the impossibility of finding substitutes fit to take their places. During the week the weather was such as to create grave doubts as to the practicality of carrying out the match at all, but, in spite of the frost, the ground was not in a condition to merit the appelation of dangerous ,and the easterly wind was so piercing that the game was of necessity most animated, as every player was forced to enter into the fight with spirit. The Middlesex captain won the toss, and thereby gained a sturdy ally in the wind, which blew aslant the ground, though the direction was very much against Surrey .At the outset the comparative strength of the two elevens became manifest ,as within a few minutes a long kick by A.C. Thompson was so badly judged by the Surrey goal-keeper (BL"a "ground man") that a goal was scored for Middlesex ,and ends were changed. With the wind Surrey naturally made a better fight , and for some time the game was more even, though now and again a run of the Middlesex forwards would display without doubt the debility of the opposite backs. An occasional change of players in this department would for a time excite the hope that a capable representative

had been discovered for Surrey in this department, but it speedily subsided as the want became more manifest by the ill-success of the several candidates . Still, for a long time Surrey resisted all attacks ,until at length a short run down by R.W.Powell, followed by an exceedingly well-turned kick from the foot of the same player was productive of a second goal for Middlesex. Again positions were reversed, but still Middlesex was fated to score, for not long afterwards A.F.Kinnaird was able – thanks to the passive attitude of the goal-keeper, who should have been able to prevent the ball passing between the posts-to secure a goal. After this third success, the play became more interesting, as the Surrey forwards, undismayed by all reverses, played up with the greatest vigour, and gradually the game became more exciting ,as C.J.Chenery , A.K.Kingsford, and W.E.Sprott worked their way up into the neighbourhood of the Middlesex stronghold. Several times did they succeed in passing the first line of defence, but either they met with a sufficient obstacle as they approached nearer to the goal, or, as happened in many cases, they failed to play to each other as they should have done to achieve success. However, just before play ceased, a god run by E.L. Edwards for Surrey resulted in a goal for that side, and thus Middlesex remained at the finish with a majority of two goals. For Middlesex the play of A.C. Thompson as half back was so good as to contribute in no small measure to the victory for their party ,while forward R.W.Powell distinguished himself greatly.For Surrey, C.J. Chenery and R.K. Kingsford worked hard throughout forward to atone for the deficiences observable in other departments."

N.B. Sportsman 25/2/73 P.3,26/2/73 P.3,1/3/73 P.64/3/73 P.3,5/3/73 P.3, 6/3/73 P.3,and 8/3/73 P.6 have details of the forthcoming match.

FA 1873 P.48:"Return Match.The Oval was in turn the venue of the Second International Contest, the date being Saturday, March 8,1873. The play was chiefly remarkable for the rapidity with which the respective goals were lost and won; as, when time was called, the English team had placed 4 to their credit (Capt. Kenyon-Slaney 2, A.G. Bonsor, C.J. Chenery) while the Northerners claimed 2 (H.W. Renny-Tailyour, W. Gibb). No less than 3,000 passed the turnstiles during the afternoon."

F:"On Saturday last the second of the international matches, played under the auspices of the Football Association, took place on the Surrey Cricket Ground at Kennington Oval. The first, it may be remembered, did not produce any success to either country, the scene of action on that occasion being the West of Scotland Cricket Ground, at Partick, near Glasgow. The English committee were then able to secure a fair representative eleven, and the result was a very spirited contest without obvious inequality. In this second meeting, however, the positions of the two sides were reversed, to the great disadvantage of Scotland. It was now the turn of the English eleven to play on their own ground, while the Scottish captain had to face the difficulty of getting his best forces to engage in a match at such a very remote distance from their own home. Thus it was not a matter of surprise that England were able to boast an eleven that could hardly have been improved, while on the other hand, the loss of two of his best forwards, Messrs Weir, and Leckie, could not but prove a great disappointment to the commander of the Scottish forces. The excitement evinced in the contest, as far as the English were concerned, was evinced by the fact that upwards of seventy candidates were at the disposal of the committee of the Football Association for the selection of the English players, making the final choice one of no small difficulty. Ultimately, though, an eleven was chosen, and this it was that took the field on Saturday last, the only exceptions being that T.C. Hooman, of the Wanderers, had reluctantly, in consequence of illness, to cede his place to Captain Kenyon-Slaney, who was the first reserve man on the list. Signs of interest in the contest were not wanting outside the immediate circle of the Association, and it was generally voted that nothing but fine weather was needed to bring the match to a successful issue. Here, too, the managing committee was singularly fortunate, as, despite two heavy showers, that threatened to do serious damage by their intervention, just at an inopportune moment, the weather was most propitious. The consequence was that the ground boasted such an assemblage as has never been equalled on the occasion of a football match

in the neighbourhood of London, the official returns proving that upwards of 3000 spectators had passed through the turnstiles. With the ground a little greasy from the recent rain, play began precisely at three o'clock with a kick off from the foot of L.S. Howell, the English back. From this it will be inferred that the toss for choice of positions had been gained by the Scottish captain; and this success was of no mean importance as a very strong breeze was blowing directly down the ground in the faces of the English. At first the play was erratic, and neither side set to work in a promissing style, though luck at the outset favoured the English eleven. Within the first few minutes, indeed, they secured two goals, both by good fortune, as the opening rush enabled Capt. Kenyon-Slaney to obtain one, chiefly owing to the fact that the ball was just greasy enough to slip out of the grasp of the goalkeeper; while another fell to A.G.Bonsor almost immediately after the change of ends, in a momentary fit of oblivion the Scottish goalkeeper touching the ball on its passage through the goal posts from a free kick to the English. These early reverses seemed to bode ill for the Scotch Eleven, and their supporters were naturally ill at ease. Stranger things, though, were in store, as with the wind again in their favour, the Scotchmen set to work with a will, and before long a truly brilliant run by Lieut.Renny-Tailyour culminated in a very well gained goal for Scotland, the difficulty of the final kick being such as to elicit loud applause from the on-lookers. Hardly had ends been reversed before the ball again neared the immediate neighbourhood of the English goal, and, by good backing up, W. Gibb secured its surrender for the second time, the game at this time showing the remarkable feature of four goals in twenty minutes. To have the aid of the wind was now the fortune of the Scotch, and for a short time the play was really interesting, as the Englishmen were not working well together, and thus their opponents were placed on better terms. Slowly and surely the English forwards now settled down into a more united style of play, and, though it was some little time before Capt. Slaney kicked the third goal for England, it was evident that they were improving as time progressed, while the exertions that had been made by the Scotchmen had caused them to show signs of flagging. The third goal for England gave all the benefit of wind to them, and while they enjoyed this advantage, they gave their opponents little quarter. Indeed, the defence of their goal-keeper was taxed sorely by one unceasing series of shots at his fortress, until at length, after a really brilliant resistance, a kick by C.J.Chenery escaped his reach, and the fourth goal was inscribed for England. During the last quarter of an hour the Scottish Eleven, stimulated by the nearer approach of defeat, struggled most gallantly to retrieve their laurels, and once the effective goal-keeping of the English captain alone prevented the attainment of their desires. Half past four o'clock, however, came at last without any further incident, and thus a decisive majority was left to England, the score showing four goals to two."

"After the match, at the invitation of the committee of the Football Association, the Scotchmen were entertained to dinner at the Freemason's Tavern, Mr E.C. Morley, the President of the Association, taking the chair, and Mr C.W. Alcock, the hon. sec., the vice-chair. The chief toasts were, of course, the Association, and the two Elevens, and the greatest enthusiasm was displayed in their reception."

C:"The toss was won by the Present Carthusians, and E.H.Parry kicked off;the ball was immediately caught by C.G.Paget, who, fond of old customs, naturally forgot to remember our new rule forbidding all use of hands. A.F. Clarke then let us know that his running talents were not yet lost. The Present, however, proved fully equal to the occasion, and for more than half an hour the game was very even. But when once the spell was broken, goals were kicked in quick succession by both sides, so that at the call of time seven goals had been scored. The first was obtained by J.F. Inglis. Then T.P. Gandell (Captain last Quarter) and E.F. Brown rendered service to their side by stopping E.H. Parry, who had brought the ball dangerously near. H.G. Jeaffreson was more successful, for in about ten minutes he had kicked two goals for the Present. Within five minutes more E.V. Ravenshaw, having with difficulty passed W.W. Drew, kicked a second goal for the Old Carthusians. The game was now a tie, but was not destined to remain so for long, for the Present Carthusians, through N.L. Abdy, scored a third goal. A fourth soon followed this, and it seemed certain that the Present must win; but the Old Carthusians thought differently, and before time a third goal was obtained for them by J.F. Inglis. The Present thus remained victors by four goals to three after a most glorious game, which lasted more than an hour and a half."

BL"...On arrival at the ground the Londoners must have been surprised to see the number of spectators who had mustered, there being no less than 5000, although at the international (Association) match on Saturday week at the Oval, the attendance (about 3000) testifies to an awakening interest in the metropolis."

F:"London was fairly represented, though at the last moment it was severely crippled by the inability of L.S.Howell and R.W.S.Vidal to travel so far North.On the other hand Sheffield had mustered its full strength.."

SM:"It was ...arranged that their third meeting should be managed as in the previous season, the first half of the game being played according to the rules of the Sheffield, the second according to those of the +Football Association. Soon after three o'clock the ball was kicked off by the Londoners, Sheffield having the slight benefit in the wind blowing obliquely across the ground. At the outset the play was slightly in favour of the Sheffielders, as the Londoners never settle down to the rules of the place without some difficulty. Gradually though the play was more even, and until the end it bore a decidedly impartial aspect, as the ball alternated to and fro between the goals. Indeed, the play may almost be summed up in the description that the match was one of the most even that we have ever seen, the spectators being roused to a pitch of the greatest excitement as each goal seemed to be menaced in turn. For some time neither side gained any positive advantage, but at length, when about half an hour had elapsed, the ball was thrown from touch cleverly by J.C. Clegg, and a dexterous kick with the left foot by that player landed a goal for Sheffield. Ends were now changed and soon afterwards Sampson apparently obtained another goal at the lower end of the ground, but the ball had just been previously fouled by one of the players, so that the shouts of the onlookers were rather premature. This was the last noteworthy incident until the call of half time came to produce a short interval for the purpose of enabling the two elevens to prepare for the provisions of the Association game which were to guide the second half. The Londoners certainly now appeared to great advantage by reason of their excellent dribbling, and it was not very long before, after some good play by C.J.Chenery, a goal was secured for London by R.K.Kingsford. With the two sides now on an even footing, and the remainder of the play according to London rules, it was generally fancied that the Southerners would have an excellent chance of victory. So, indeed, it seemed, but at the end ill luck greatly interfered with the prospects of the London eleven. First, an attempt by A.C. Thompson to save the goal by a flying kick caused the ball by a miskick to pass over his head into the centre of the posts before the goal keeper could prevent its passage, a very aggrevating piece of misfortune after the energy that had been displayed by the whole of their side. Then again, after the third change of ends, many well-executed attacks by the forwards of London just missed the desired success, and when only five minutes remained of time a splenedid kick by A.F.Kinnaird actually hit the cross-bar and bounded over, instead of under, to the great disappointment of the eleven most interested. Thus a very hard and even match ended in favour of Sheffield by two goals to one. On their side W.H.Carr was a most efficient goal-keeper, and A.Kirke-Smith proved himself a very valuable acquisition.

Among the Londoners A.F.Kinnaird, C.J.Chenery, and Hubert Heron were most prominent, the forwards all working well and unselfishly throughout."

+SI:"The main difference is the off-side rule as regards three men, which explained, simply means that the third man from the goal can compel all his opponents to be in front of him, so that the plan of fixing the field as in Sheffield rules is useless. The play is thus compressed some times in very little space. Of course the players can follow the ball, but if behind the third man, are off-side and out of play. Ends remained unchanged, so that london still had the wind with them."

was kicked,by the non-arrival of A.C.Thompson,the back on whom the Londoners had chiefly relied for this match." "during the first quarter of an hour,indeed,the ball was kept well in the quarters of Nottingham,...." "...the Nottingham Eleven were able to resist successfully the attacks of the Londoners until the end of half-time necessitated a change of ends. A short interval occurred here, but the game was soon resumed under circumstances very similar in character. The Londoners still maintained a decided advantage, and it was not until the last quarter of an hour that they allowed their adversaries to make a succession of incursions into their portion of the ground."

BROCKBANK, J.B. (Cambridge University), Wanderers. Very fast and turns quickly. He is often of the greatest service to an Eleven.

CHENERY, C.J. (Crystal Palace). An excellent dribbler, never far from the ball, and always playing the game thoroughly.

CLEGG, J.C., Sheffield and Norfolk (Sheffield) Club. One of the fastest dribblers of the day, and an excellent shot in the neighbourhood of goal.

CLEGG, W.E., Sheffield. A very fair half-back; a good and safe kick.

GOODWYN,A.G.,Royal Engineers. Has proved himself to be a faultless back;kicking with great skill,and rarely allowing himself to be passed.

GREENHALGH, E.H., Notts. Plays back for the Notts Eleven, and has rendered great service to his Club.

HERON,H.,Uxbridge. Made his first appearance in London during last season,is active and very effective as a dribbler.Promises to make a really first rate player.

RHIND, Alex. (Queen's Park). Capital dribbler. Has not played since November International.

SMITH, J. (South Norwood). A hardworking player, but too impetuous, and not always of use.

SMITH,R.(South Norwood). A persevering but not gifted player.

TAYLOR, J. (Queen's Park). Good back, very fast, but light.

- A.L.A.WOODHOUSE, fell off very much at the end of the year, though at once considered first choice; fairly quick and occasionally brilliant, but tires too soon.

THE FOOTBALL ASSOCAITION

RULES OF THE ASSOCIATION (P.59)

- 1. That the Association be called "The Football Association".
- 2.That all Clubs, playing Association Rules, be eligible for Membership.
- 3. That the Subscription for each Club be 5s per annum, payable in advance.

- 4.That the officers be a President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary, with a Committee comprising the afore-mentiond officers and seventeen other Memebrs. Five to form a quorum. That it be in the power of the Committee to appoint one of their body to act as Assistant Secretary, if required.
- 5. That the officers be elected at the Annual Meeting by a majority of the representatives of Clubs present, the retiring officers to be eligible for re-election.
- 6. That the General Meeting be held in the month of February.
- 7. That each Club be entitled to send two representatives to all Meetings of the Association, the privelege being granted to provincial Clubs of sending deputies, no two Clubs to be represented by the same deputies.
- 8. That in the event of an alteration being deemed necesary in the rules or the laws established by the Association, notice of the proposed alteration shall be sent in writing to the Secretary on or before the 1<sup>st</sup> of February in each year; and the terms of the proposed alteration shall be advertised in such sporting newspapers as the Committee may direct, at least 14 days prior to the Annual Meeting.
- 9. That each Club shall forward to the Secretary a statement of its distinguishing colours or costume.
- 10. That the average circumference of the Association Football shall be not less than 27 inches, and not more than 28 inches; and that the ball used in the matches for the Association Challenge Cup be of this regulation size."

SHEFFIELD FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION OFF-SIDE RULES:
London:
"When a player kicks the ball, any one of the same side, who, at such moment of kicking, is nearer to the opponents' goal line is out of play, and may not touch the ball, nor in any way whatsoever prevent any other player from doing so until the ball has been played, unless there are at least three of his opponents nearer their own goal line; but, no player is out of play when the ball is kicked from the goal line."
Sheffield:
"Any player between an opponent's goal and goalkeeper, (unless he has followed the ball there,) is off-side and out of play. The goal keeper is that player on the defending side who, for the time being, is nearest to his own goal."

# FOOTBALL IN AMERICA:

Bell's life 14/12/72 P.8:The Turf,Field,and farm says this,among other field games of English origin,has been Americanised,and promises in time to become very popular.For the edification of those desirous of forming clubs,we subjoin the following:

## **RULES FOR THE GAME OF FOOTBALL**

- 1. Ground must be at least 860 feet long and 225 feet wide.
- 2.Goal must be eight paces.
- 3. Each side shall number 20 players.
- 4.To win a game five out of nine goals are necessary.
- 5.No throwing or running with the ball; if either, it is a foul ball, and it must then be thrown perpendicularly in the air by the side causing the foul.
- 6.No holding the ball or free kicks allowed.
- 7.A ball passing the boundary by the side of the goal shall be kicked on from the boundary by the side who has that goal.

- 8.A ball passing beyond the limit on the side of the field shall be kicked on horizontally to the boundary by the side which kicked it out, the players not being compelled to stand on their own side, but allowed to hold any position in the field they see fit.
- 9.No tripping or holding of players.
- 10. The winner of the first toss has the choice of position. The winner of the second toss has the first kick off.
- 11. The ball must be started ten paces from the goal, and each side must stand back of the line, which is ten paces from their goal. The ball can be babied at the start.
- 12. There shall be four judges and two referees."
